

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
Introduction to SASH Club

- Concept based on the SSAIS video "Sexual Harassment: Not in Our School!"
- Modeled on National Organization for Women's "Campus Activism: How to Become a NOW Activist in High School"
- Initial website launched 2021, redesigned and expanded August 2023

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Where to use SASH Club resources

- Existing clubs, such as feminist groups, gay straight alliance, clubs devoted to civil rights, disabilities, students of color
- Youth-serving organizations in the local community
- Chapters of national organizations: Girls Learn International (GLI) includes SASH Club resources in their curriculum
- Additional activities listed in the How to Start a SASH Club guide and on the Additional Activities webpage can be used anywhere

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Student benefits: Personal safety

- Learn about harms students may encounter in their personal lives e.g., dating violence, alcohol and date rape drugs, sextortion, sexting
- Learn to identify harassing behaviors and how to report or get help





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Student benefits: Empathy

 Learn about harms experienced by other students, e.g., sexual harassment of males, students with disabilities, and students of color; understand victim-blaming





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Student benefits: Social interaction


- Engage in respectful behavior, thereby reducing incidents of sexual harassment both on and off campus
- Learn how to call out harassing behaviors






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Student benefits: Elevate voices

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Student benefits: Leadership opportunities


- Develop leadership skills
- Serve their school or local communities (activities, assemblies, networking with other clubs and community organizations)
- Contribute to the SASH Club (national level) to build their college or work portfolio
- Leave a legacy for the next group of student leaders

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Classroom benefits

- Use SASH Club information to inform school projects, e.g., surveys, history of Title IX, journalism projects
- Experience improved academic outcomes when personal harms are avoided



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School benefits

- Demonstrates school's commitment to a culture of respect and gender equity
- Helps students better understand unhealthy behaviors and how to seek help from school staff
- Provides a constructive way for students to address sexual harassment rather than resorting to graffiti, social media accounts about perpetrators, spreading rumors, etc.

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School benefits

"I frequently had to educate the school community on the obligations of schools to allow a GSA (then known as Gay Straight Alliance). The right of students to establish a GSA (or a SASH Club) at school is guaranteed by both the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and the federal Equal Access Act as long as other student clubs are allowed. Educating students on their rights and giving them a voice to rectify injustices is an instrumental goal of schooling."

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SASH Club has a right to meet at school

The How to Start a SASH Club guide offers steps to take if facing obstacles to starting a club:

- Check school policies to see whether you have met the requirements to start a club
- Explain that SASH Clubs can help reduce sexual harassment and assault that students face
- Explain that the school is demonstrating that it supports students who wish to ensure they are treated respectfully and equitably
- Explain that the SASH Club resources appear in the American Federation of Teachers Share My Lesson Library






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

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Virtual SASH Club



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SASH Club recruitment

Jordan High School students Jane and Daniel Golonka describe how they started a club in their blog, "SASH Club: Shifting School Culture to Combat Sexual Harassment".



Daniel: "We walked around with fliers and donuts to tell people about our club. We also put catchy ads in the school announcements and talked to a writer from our student newspaper about the club. We posted flyers at school and reminders on social media."

Jane: "We set up a table at the activity fair at our school's open house in August. We told our friends, posted on our personal social media, and created an Instagram page."

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SASH Club early accomplishments

Jordan High School students Jane and Daniel Golonka describe their early accomplishments.



Daniel: "I'm especially excited about the research and evaluation committee, which will identify issues that Jordan students are most concerned about. It will work to evaluate the impact the club may have on the school climate."

Jane: "I am really proud of the connections we have already made within the school, in the larger Durham community. It is heartening to see so many people willing to support our efforts. I am grateful to attend a school that supports the club's efforts from administration to most of the students."

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
