




Q Patriarchy



In sociology, patriarchy is described as a form of social organization where cultural and institutional beliefs and values are dominated by men.






Q Masculinity



A social construct that refers to the behaviors, characteristics, and expectations associated with men.






Q Misogyny



Hatred of, aversion to, or prejudice against women or girls.






Q Manosphere



A varied collection of websites, blogs, and online forums promoting masculinity, misogyny, and opposition to feminism.






A distorted consensus


A soapbox community

How is this new?

- This version of hegemonic masculinity...
 - » Uses evolutionary psychology concepts and terms
 - » Not as connected to religious traditions
 - » Not interested in marriage
 - » Does not center homohysteria
 - » Shares a common language, distinct jargon
 - » Heavily influenced by online dating norms
 - » Websites, online forums, and social media are unique mediums, shaping (not just transmitting) content






Masculinities

Instead of proffering a single type of man and masculinity to emulate and aspire to, young boys and men should be free to embrace a plurality of behaviors and models for being a man.

The problem with the hegemonic masculine ideal is not only the content of that ideal, but the very notion that there is one way to be a man.

Three R's

- Recognize
- Respond
- Reframe



Recognize

- Acknowledge behavior/perspective
- Seek to understand motivation



Respond

- Highlight impact
- Lean on systems and practices
- Work to heal harm



Reframe

- Counternarrative
- Create space for belonging
- Align behavior with values

- Both tangible and aspirational

- Consistency is key






Strategies: Federal, state, and district level protections

"Misogynistic and anti-LGBTQ+ behaviors violate students' right to an education free from sex discrimination. After a federal court vacated the 2024 Title IX regulations on 1/9/25 as unconstitutional, Title IX reverted to the 2020 regulations. Title IX is still the law of the land in the U.S. It includes many useful elements to hold schools accountable: most importantly, the requirement to make the District's Title IX Coordinator contact information widely known. The Title IX Coordinator is the starting point for anyone needing support and protection from acts of sexual violence, misogyny, or hate that affect access to school resources." —Heidi Goldstein






Strategies: Federal, state, and district level protections

"Allies and advocates will need to familiarize themselves with their state law protections against discrimination, which vary widely by state. "In the thousands of complaints I handled over 18 years, the overwhelming majority came from white, middle-class suburban households. I found that people of color, immigrants and refugees, and poor people of all backgrounds were reluctant to complain, already feeling marginalized and powerless to obtain any level of justice or support. We must reach out to help those from differing cultural backgrounds understand their rights and develop the skills and understanding to make themselves heard."—Dr. Bill Howe, former state of Connecticut Title IX Coordinator













SASH Club

- Opportunities to share opinions, support one another, ask questions, make friends, become leaders






SASH Club


What does SASH Club offer?


- Informative Power Topic presentations on a wide range of topics of interest to youth














Misogyny and Male Supremacy: It's Not Just a Joke

- What are responses educators and students can take to counter misogyny and male supremacist language?







Girls Learn International


With 165 school and community-based chapters, GLI is building a movement of informed advocates devoted to social change.



- It weaves together leadership development, mental health interventions, media literacy, social-emotional learning, and gender-based violence prevention.
- The curriculum, aimed at high school and college students, features eight modules. Each module includes facilitator guides, handouts, and video clips from The Representation Project films.

After completing the GET curriculum, students reported:








Bystander Intervention Models

Culture change models that are being used to combat interpersonal violence. Generally, includes three steps:

- Recognizing problematic behavior
- Developing skills to intervene
- · Creating community where violence is less likely to occur




