Meeting #3: #MisogynyFreeSchools Zine Showcase




- We debuted the "We Have the Power to Create





- Bella contributed an educational piece to the collaborative zine <u>"We Have the Power to Create</u> <u>#MisogynyFreeSchools"</u> drawing from real conversations with friends.
- She also supported the development of the #MisogynyFreeSchools campaign by building a social media strategy to promote safe & inclusive schools.
- As Bella shared, "Dating now is about being alert. You're protecting yourself in a world that still makes misogyny look like a personality trait."

Dating in the Face of Misogyny

Dating in this day and age isn't just about chemistry: It's about safety. Eccause with so many men consuming misograistic content, dating today means asking. Is this person safe? Do they actually respect women?

So you get strategie.

You casually ask what kind of media they like. Joe Rogan? Caution.

Andrew Tate? Absolutely not.

Then you scrull their Instagram.

Who are they following? Is it full of misogynistic creators?

That's not just a preference: that's a presiew of how they see you.

Pay attention to the "jokes."

The ones they say just to see if you'll laugh. The weird reaction when someone mentions a political topic.

The weird reaction when someone mentions a political topic That's not harmless. That's them testing your boundaries.

Ask the real questions:

Do they have women in their lives they actually respect? What do they think about a woman's right to choose? Do they believe in human rights, or just their own condort?






Souleymane




- This changemaker is a globally known singer whose recent tour became one of the biggest in history.
- After experiencing sexual assault, she chose to take her case to court.
- She filed a symbolic countersuit for \$1, stating that the value of standing up for herself and other survivors was "immeasurable."
- A jury ruled in her favor, affirming accountability and sending a powerful message.





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Taylor Swift





- This changemaker is an American activist from New York
 City who has worked for years to support survivors of sexual violence.
- In 2006, she started a program for youth in junior and high schools to address sexual abuse in their communities.
- Over a decade later, her movement went viral and became a global conversation about abuse and accountability.
- She was named one of Time's "Silence Breakers" and later founded an international organization.



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Tarana Burke





- Often called the "Godmother of Title IX," she helped make education more equitable for women.
- She documented sexual and peer harassment on college campuses and coined the phrase "the chilly campus climate."
- Her advocacy helped shape federal law so that women and girls could access education free from sex discrimination.
- Recognized nationally, she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame and honored for decades of work advancing women's rights.





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Bernice Sandler





- This changemaker is a musician, composer, and playwright known for creating Broadway hits that spotlight history, culture, and social issues.
- He used his platform to raise awareness and funds for disaster relief in Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria.
- He advocates for education, immigrant rights, and access to the arts, inspiring youth and communities worldwide.
- Through his work, he combines creativity with activism, showing how art can drive social change.





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Lin-Manuel Miranda





- This activist began a solo school strike at age 15 to demand government action on climate change.
- Her protest inspired the global Fridays for Future movement, engaging youth around the world.
- She was named Time Person of the Year in 2019 and credited with sparking a global movement raising awareness about climate justice and youth activism.





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Greta Thunberg





- This athlete is one of the most decorated gymnasts in history, with multiple Olympic and World Championship medals.
- She bravely spoke out about sexual abuse she experienced and criticized the systems that enabled it, wearing a custom leotard to honor survivors.
- She made headlines for prioritizing her mental health during the Olympics, sparking a global conversation about athletes' well-being.





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Simone Biles






- Born into slavery in the early 19th century, he escaped and became a powerful voice for freedom and equality.
- He was a prolific writer and abolitionist who exposed the realities of slavery through speeches and autobiographies.
- He actively supported women's rights, attended the Seneca
 Falls Convention, and advocated for women's suffrage.
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Frederick Douglass





- U.S. Women's National Soccer Team star, World Cup champion, and Olympic gold medalist.
- Advocate for gender equality in sports, including equal pay for female athletes.
- Openly LGBTQ+ and vocal about LGBTQ+ rights and inclusion.
- Uses her platform to speak out on racial justice, immigrant rights, and social equity issues.





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Megan Rapinoe



Celebrating Changemakers



- This artist from Mexico is known for her portraits and selfportraits that explore identity, gender, class, and race.
- Despite lifelong health challenges, she became one of the most celebrated painters of the 20th century.
- Her work blends realism with fantasy and draws heavily on Mexican folk culture, politics, and personal experience.
- She is regarded as a feminist and LGBTQ+ icon, and her paintings continue to inspire art, activism, and cultural pride worldwide.





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Frida Kahlo





- This changemaker co-founded a national organization addressing sexual harassment and assault in K-12 schools.
- She brought a federal investigation to the Seattle School District
 after staff negligence led to sexual violence, thereby compelling the
 district to comply with Title IX.
- Drawing on her experiences as a student, parent, educator, and researcher, she addresses systemic failures in K-12 schools.
